



Message to 35th LD from Congressman Derek Kilmer 6th CD Democrat:

Hello, fellow Democrats!

Let me just start off by saying <u>thank you</u> for staying involved in the midst of the pandemic. It matters that you're continuing to do the important work of our party.

People keep asking me "When do we get back to normal?" But the reality is we need a new normal that's not just focused on blocking Trump – but on advancing our Democratic values.

We as Democrats believe that – in our new normal – folks should have the protections they need so they don't have to choose between their health and their paycheck. We've passed paid leave in the House.

Our new normal should do a better job of respecting and compensating our frontline workers – whether they work in a hospital or a school, for the government or a grocery store. That's why we're fighting to increase the minimum wage and embrace equal pay for equal work. We passed that in the House.

In the old normal, we've seen Republicans persistently trying to dismantle Obamacare. Our new normal should include healthcare reform so that – in the greatest country on the planet – you don't go broke because you get sick. We should protect people with pre-existing conditions, reduce the price of prescription medications and expand Medicare. We've passed that in the House.

In our new normal, we need to protect our democracy. The elections we've seen in Georgia, Wisconsin, Kentucky, and other states during the pandemic have been disasters. The disenfranchisement that cost Stacey Abrams the governorship was a disgrace. In the House, we've passed a new voting rights act and legislation to stand up against big money and special interests.

In our new normal, we need to combat police brutality and address racial injustice. Recently, I've joined protests throughout our region where amazing groups - mostly led by young people - showed up and spoke up for justice. We did that because too many innocent Black Americans are being killed in communities around our country. In the House, we're working for real structural changes that address the systemic inequities facing Black Americans. I was proud to join my colleagues in the Congressional Black Caucus in introducing, sponsoring, and voting for the Justice in Policing Act, which would - among other things - change training standards, prevent the use of excessive force and racial bias, ensure independent investigations and prosecutions related to the use of deadly force, and stop militarizing law enforcement so protestors don't face war zone conditions.

In our new normal, let's reject Donald Trump's policies that separate immigrant children from their parents, that ban people based on their faiths, that require law-abiding families and Dreamers to live in fear of deportation. America should welcome immigrants like my mom and grandma and value diversity. We've passed protections in the House for immigrants, for women, and for the LGBTQ community.

In our new normal, let's protect our environment and take action on climate change. House Democrats passed legislation to join the rest of the world in the Paris Climate Agreement and stop Trump from drilling off our coasts.

While we can't be together right now physically, we can still be together in making sure that the failed leadership of Donald Trump is ended this November.

We can be together in supporting <u>Darcy Huffman</u> and <u>Colton Myers</u> – two terrific candidates for the legislature who need our help to ensure that they're representing us in Olympia next year.

We can be together in working to elect Democrats up and down the ballot – in every race in every place – so we can advance our Democratic values.
